An Important Message on Pastoral Care



Help your parish help you!

Following the example of Jesus, the Church makes caring for the sick an important part of its ministry and mission: "The Lord himself showed great concern for the bodily and spiritual welfare of the sick and commanded his followers to do likewise." (Rite for the Anointing of the Sick). Catholic health care facilities continue to play an important role in our Archdiocese, while a regular program of pastoral care is carried on by the parish in homes, care facilities, and hospitals.

Our parish cares for the sick and infirm in two main ways. The priests ensure that the sick and the dying receive the sacraments and celebrate other rites with them and their families at the appropriate times. We no longer speak of the anointing of the sick as "the last rites," because the Sacrament of the Sick is meant to sustain the sick in time of illness and even, when appropriate, to promote their recovery.

This sacrament "gives the grace of the Holy Spirit to those who are sick: by this grace the whole person is helped and saved, sustained by trust in God, and strengthened against the temptations of the Evil One and against anxiety over death. Thus the sick person is able not only to bear the suffering bravely, but also to fight against it. A return to physical health may follow the reception of this sacrament if it will be beneficial to the sick person's salvation."

There are, however, other rites the priests celebrate with the dying and their families, at appropriate times. Ministry to the dying "places emphasis on trust in the Lord's promise to eternal life rather than on the struggle against illness, which is characteristic of the pastoral care of the sick."

Our dedicated volunteer ministers, assisted by Fr. Jose, regularly take Holy Communion to parishioners who are infirm, rather than acutely ill, whether at home or at some local care facilities.

At Vancouver General and St. Paul's Hospitals chaplains and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion daily visit sick parishioners and those recovering from surgery.

Identifying yourself as a Catholic on admission to hospital helps to ensure these pastoral visits.

Obviously, this is a complex ministry involving many people, serving an increasing number of the sick and infirm. We can't provide good pastoral care to the sick without your help. We need to hear from you!

What you can do

- Whenever a family member falls seriously ill, call the rectory immediately. **Do not leave a voicemail in such cases.** Always make personal contact with the rectory staff, or with one of the priests on their cell phones. If you do not make contact, reach the on-call Catholic priest at VGH or St. Paul's through the hospital switchboards—they carry a cell phone 24/7.
- Call the parish office in advance whenever you anticipate that you or a family member will have a hospital stay of more than two nights, or are preparing for any major surgery. The Sacrament of the Sick can be celebrated in the church, at home, or in hospital.
- In emergencies, call Msgr. Smith on his cell phone 604-657-3715.
- Do not hesitate to ask to receive Holy Communion at home, regularly, or whenever you will be missing more than two Sundays for reasons of health.
