5 pm Mass—Total Attendance: 93

of people who said Yes: 43

9 am Mass—Total Attendance: 124

of people who said Yes: 67

11 am Mass—Total Attendance: 192

of people who said Yes: 90

Total Attendance at All Masses: 409

Total Number of People Who Said Yes: 200

An average of **48.8%** of all in attendance said "Yes" to helping!

This is higher than the average response (38%) in other parishes of the Archdiocese of Vancouver.

Thank you to our dedicated phone callers who have been making 200 phone calls, emails, and text messages this past week to hear from all the people who said yes!

GOOD NEWS, BAD NEWS

The **good news** is that the parish finance council has approved a plan to simplify—and reduce—the many second collections in the parish, which were happening almost every week. Instead of a monthly collection for the needy, we will support charitable causes annually through Project Advance, with two special collections each year for charity, one near Christmas and the other in the summer months. But we did not remove all of the extra envelopes from your boxes—the finance council resolved that there should be two special collections each year to help cover the costs of repairs, maintenance, and other facility issues in our parish.

The **bad news** is that the first special collection for Facility Improvements comes on the heels of learning that our furnace has to be replaced—at a cost of **\$40,000**. After shivering through Mass last Sunday, most parishioners will consider this a very worthy cause! It is, however, an unfortunate and unplanned expense, so we are asking you to give as generously as your means allow.

But there's **more good news**: a generous parishioner learned of the broken boiler and made a **\$10,000** contribution to our first ever Facility Improvements collection. May God bless her and all our generous parish stewards!

January 21, 2024: Sunday of the Word of God



This Sunday gives us an opportunity to reflect on how we can become better listeners of the Lord. When it feels like we can't say the right thing in prayer, turn to **Lectio Divina**. Simply open the Bible to a passage, and try to listen well. In doing this, we might hear more clearly what God is asking of us — opening ourselves to peace, gratitude, and living rooted in Christ.

What is Lectio Divina?

Lectio divina means "divine reading" in Latin. It's a meditative way of reading the Bible in which we let go of our own agendas and open ourselves to what God is trying to say to us.

It's not the same as Bible Study

While Lectio Divina is a great way to study the Bible, it isn't the same thing as a Bible study. Lectio Divina offers something more specific, more personal to you, in the moment you are praying. Bible studies lead us to interpret the Bible by asking questions and at times, doing research, and looking at the Bible as a whole. Lectio Divina, on the other hand, asks us to intentionally focus on a short section of Scripture. This prayerful focus could be one passage, one verse, or even just one word.

How to Pray Lectio Divina

The time you spend praying the Lectio Divina is entirely up to you and varies by person.

1. Read.

Take a short passage from the Bible and listen to it carefully. Let it soak in. If you're praying with a Bible, maybe start with a passage you've heard before. For example, you could pray with an excerpt from any of the Psalms, Jesus' visit to Mary and Martha (Luke 10:38-42), the story of the Woman at the Well (John 4), or the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12).

2. Meditate.

Then, after reading or listening for a second time, consider: What sticks out to you? Perhaps it's a particular image, phrase, or single word. Let that be your focus, meditating on what might God be trying to show you through what stands out.

3. Pray.

Respond to the text and to God. Ask God to show you what He wants you to take from it. This could lead you to offer thanks, ask forgiveness, or simply talk with God about what the passage brought to your heart.

4. Contemplate.

Rest with God. Be aware of God's presence with you. Listen for His voice.
