

Gospel Reflection for Sunday, February 5, 2023

(shortened version)

Jesus is speaking to his disciples, and he compares them to three things: *You are the salt of the earth; you are the light of the world; you are a city set on a hill.* Here's what I want you to see: all three of these things do not exist for themselves; they exist for the sake of something else. Look at salt. In Jesus' time, salt was the way you preserved meat. Salt was also used in the ancient world to destroy. When one city conquered another, it burned down the city, tore down the walls, then salted the earth to make sure nothing would ever grow there again. Salt had a purpose- to enhance, to preserve, and to destroy.

You are the light of the world. Think about it. We don't really see light. Light is that by which we see other things. Light is a means of illumination. It makes other things visible; it brings beautiful things to light and enhances them. But light suddenly shining in a dark corner can also reveal unsavory things, like insects and vermin. Light can enhance and

also reveal what's imperfect. The point is: it is for the sake of something else.

What about a city set on a hill? It's how people navigated in Jesus' time. Long before maps and GPS systems, people would find a landmark as a means of navigation. Without a city set on a hill, I would not know where I was going.

What is Jesus saying to us? *You who follow me, you who take in my teaching, **you are meant for others.** The main purpose is not primarily to make you holy. Rather, I am making you holy and happy that you might become the vehicle by which others become holy and happy. I want you to be a beacon of light that illumines the way for others; I want you to be salt that's meant to preserve and enhance what is good and true and beautiful in the world; I want you to be a city set on a hill by which others navigate their lives.*

What if salt loses its savor? This salt is no good at all. It doesn't preserve anything, it doesn't destroy what needs destroying, it loses its power. Now what will happen if we lose our savor as Christians? The world around us will go bad. If I don't do my mission, things that are meant to be enhanced, won't be enhanced; things meant to be preserved, won't be preserved; things meant to be destroyed or challenged won't be destroyed or challenged. That's the hinge upon which a lot of the spiritual life turns.

The 20th century was the bloodiest on record, more than all previous centuries combined. Here's the thing that is really disturbing: where did all this mayhem take place? In the heart of deeply Christian civilizations. Tens of millions of people slaughtered in the first world war, even more in the second- in Christian countries. Why weren't more Christians putting salt in the earth of Naziism, of Communism, so they couldn't grow? Why weren't more Christians getting in the way of so much awful violence? How do you explain that?

Since Roe v Wade, more than 60 million children have been aborted in America, still largely a Christian country. How do you explain that?

The short answer: because a lot of salt had lost its savor, a lot of lights were placed under bushel baskets, and an awful lot of Christians didn't care, looked the other way, acquiesced or cooperated.

"You are the salt of the earth," Jesus said. "You are the light of the world. YOU, all of you, everyone baptized, all my followers. Don't put your light under a bushel basket; don't let your salt lose its savor."

How is your Christianity, right now, impacting the world around us? Are you making it better and getting in the way of evil and wickedness? How do you think about your spiritual life? Is it for *your* benefit, or the benefit of the world? Everything will change depending on how you take in these words.




